Seeing Through Alcohol Advertising

Directions Read the information below. Then complete the activity that follows.

Think of alcohol advertisements you've seen. What images come to mind? By understanding the ways in which advertisers work, teens can make an informed choice to avoid alcohol. To analyze an alcohol ad, ask yourself the following questions:

- What is really being advertised? If an ad shows a group of attractive people enjoying a
 product, it is "selling" the experience of being in a group of happy, popular people.
- What is the hidden message? For example, an ad that shows beer being consumed at a party gives the hidden message that you need a particular brand of beer to have fun.
- What is the truth? Think about the truth behind the advertisement. A party shown in an
 advertisement is staged. The people who look like they are having fun are acting. None of
 the risks of alcohol use are shown.
